
There is still a vacancy for one more Committee Member, so if anyone is interested then please let Angie know (clark.theateam69@btinternet.com).

DAYS OF OLD



Before Dr Richard Beeching was even born it was possible to make some local train journeys from Romiley to stations that are no longer on the rail network, thanks in part to Beeching. On the map above are many stations and lines that have been confined to history.

With that in mind we have this month come up with a quiz/ history lesson where we have provided some photographs of stations from years ago but which are no longer served by trains and next to each picture are some clues/information to see if you can identify them.

They were all accessible by a direct train from Romiley (even if that train didn't always stop there). So we hope you have a bit of fun identifying them.

1. This station was opened in 1880 and was built by the Manchester South District Railway. It closed on 2nd January 1967. Since then it has been completely demolished and redeveloped. However, the clock tower shown on the picture still stands to this day. The station had very long platforms so that it could be served by express trains that ran from



Manchester Central to London St Pancras. Indeed the last ever train to stop at the station was a Manchester Central to London St Pancras service. To encourage walkers to visit the Peak District in the 1930's special walker's trains ran on Sundays



2. This station was located in the centre of the town which it served having opened in 1867 closing some 100 years later. It was built by the Midland Railway some 4 years after the station that still serves this small Derbyshire town was opened by the

London and North Western

Railway. The line that passed through this station is still operational, but only for goods traffic. In 1957 a tragic accident occurred at the town's other station. That accident involving a runaway freight train is commemorated by a blue plaque honouring the two railwaymen who lost their lives.



3. This station opened to passengers on 1st March 1868, being the terminus station on a branch line of about 2½ miles in length. The branch and station became the joint property of the Manchester, Sheffield & Lincolnshire Railway (later Great Central) and the Midland Railway.



Unlike some nearby lines, the station

enjoyed an hourly Sunday service which was popular with walkers. Today the former line to this station is still enjoyed by walkers as it was converted into a dedicated footpath/cycleway/bridleway following its closure on 5th January 1970.



4. This is another station closed in January 1970 having opened in 1869. Following closure the station buildings were all demolished but the platforms remain to this day forming a feature and picnic area for the footpath / cycleway / bridleway that was opened in 1985 by Dr David Bellamy, the well known botanist. The building sticking out above the station buildings is a public house that in normal times

serves not just walkers but also the many people using the nearby canal.

At various times during its history you could get through trains from here to not only Romiley but also to the likes of Buxton, Macclesfield and Hyde.



5. Many of us in Romiley and hereabouts very much wish that this station was still on the rail network as it would very much ease traffic, especially at rush hour, from Romiley.

The station itself was opened in December 1865, but it was

not until some 10 years later than trains could serve Romiley with the building of a spur line. Like many other stations it was another of Beeching's victims. Trains leaving this station heading west went straight into a tunnel under part of the town. The line passing through the station was a very important freight route linking the east and west of the country until the closure of the Woodhead Tunnel in 1981.

6. This station closed well before the Beeching Axe. In fact it closed in September 1958 although to this day trains to and from Romiley pass by the station building (now a house) almost every hour in each direction.



The village that the station served has always had a bit of a complex over its actual name as to this day it has two different spellings. Not far from the former station is an extensive canal basin which is well worth a visit.

7. This station bore the names of the two districts of Manchester that it served and as can be seen from the photograph it was originally well patronised before eventually closing in July 1961 due to falling passenger numbers.



However, following closure trains still passed through the station until 1967 serving stations on either side of the closed station.

Although the station buildings were demolished, to be replaced by a modern block of flats, the track bed was retained and now carries part of the Metrolink tram service.

GARDENS AND PLANTERS

We really hope to be able to get stuck into looking after the planters and garden areas in the very near future.

As part of that we also want to carry on our work of developing the area of what was overgrown land at the bottom of the slope which we termed the Hill of Doom.






That area will initially require a decent size working party following the delivery of tons of small stones.

They will need spreading out on top of the weed proof membrane that we were able to put in place last

autumn following the successful rail industry volunteer day.

Meanwhile though it was pleasing to

observe that some colour has been returning to the planters and gardens, as can be seen from some recent photographs.







This will be undertaken during our Task Sessions, details of which will be made available when we know where things stand.

However, as in previous years we will, when the time is right, aim to

undertake those sessions on the second Saturday of each month (from 2pm) and the last Tuesday of each month (from 7pm).



NEW PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AT THE STATION

If you have walked past the station recently you will have observed that Stockport Council, after much local lobbying have installed a temporary light controlled pedestrian crossing which provides a safe way of crossing Stockport Road so as to reach the station.

This is great news as Stockport Road is a very busy road and crossing it to reach the station has not been the safest of things to do.


The temporary crossing has certainly been well used and once travel returns to normal that use can only increase yet more.
