COMMUNITY RAIL NETWORK - "DAYS OUT BY RAIL"

On 26th July the Community Rail Network launched a national awareness campaign to promote the delights and benefits of "Days Out by Rail".

The Friends of Romiley Station have joined this national campaign to highlight hidden gems along Britain's rail network.



Hopefully, the campaign will encourage local residents to get back on trains so as to discover the delights and benefits of "Days Out by Rail".

The "Days Out by Rail aims to inspire and encourage day-tripper and leisure travellers to jump aboard a train, for exciting, fun, ecofriendly outings.

It is an eight-week initiative to raise awareness about rail as one of the greenest ways to travel – especially combined with walking, cycling and buses – avoiding traffic jams, parking and pollution, while enabling exploration of lesser-known spots as part of a day out, short break or staycation.

The campaign will focus on eight themes as follows:

- 26th July 1st August: Off the Beaten Track
- 2nd 8th August: Spectacular Views
- 9th 15th August: Reconnecting with Family (intergenerational)
- 16th 22nd August: Purse-Friendly Days Out
- 23rd 29th August: Doorstep Discovery
- 30th August 5th September Rediscovering Days Out with Friends
- 6th 12th September: Scenic Walks & Cycle Rides
- 13th 19th September: Days Out for Grown-Ups

On Tuesday 13th July we were delighted to welcome a visit from Chris Jackson, Northern's Regional Director accompanied by Theo McLauchlan (Station Manager North/East Manchester & High Peaks) together with Becky Styles (Regional Community and Sustainability Manager).

Chris, Theo and Becky were given a tour of the station by Alf and Angie Clark who were able to inform them about what we as a Group were not only getting up to but also let them know our plans and aspirations for the future.

It was fantastic that they were ready, willing and able to take time out from their very busy schedule to come along to Romiley, especially with so much going on throughout the Northern network at the moment.

It is so encouraging to have such visits and to then sit down, over a coffee and cake, to discuss everything. A simply great couple of hours.

Then on Saturday 17th July Alf Clark met up with PC Brandon Fairbrother-Clarke from the British Transport Police (BTP).

Brandon, who is based on the Neighbourhood Policing Team, polices both the Buxton and Edale lines, which includes Romiley.

He is fairly new onto the scene and having been made aware of our group he wanted to come along and have a meeting.

He too was given a tour of the station, although the emphasis this time was upon ways that the Group and the BTP can work together, especially given that we are in many ways the eyes and ears as to what goes on at the station.

Some minor vandalism was shown to him and rail trespass was discussed.

We have heard that rail staff are to be trained in spotting and dealing with potential trespass and possible suicide risks. Hopefully, Groups such as ours can also be suitably trained so as to tackle such issues.

As observed there are Samaritan's posters displayed at the end of each platform but anything further that can be done would be most welcomed.

STOCKPORT'S GIGANTIC LEAP FROG ART TRAIL

The Stockport Frogs, last seen during 2019, are back again for 2021, only this time some 17 of the 38 can be found lurking in local centres, including Romiley and Woodley.



All the artwork was carried out at the Stockport Hat Works by Arc Creative Arts who specialise in providing workshops and arts projects for vulnerable adults and young people.

The frogs will be around until the end of September. They will then be auctioned off with all the proceeds going to charity.

This year sees a totally new breed of frog following themes chosen by members of the public through a Stockport wide consultation.

The Romiley Frog, located in the Precinct is "Theatre Frog" whilst the Woodley one is "Baker Frog".



So do get out and have a look at them all before they hop it.

There is a website dedicated to the frogs (www.stockportsgiganticleap.co.uk) but unfortunately in their wisdom those compiling the website, at the time of writing, make no mention whatsoever of the frogs in the district centres (or indeed those kind people and businesses who sponsored them). They have confined themselves to the 21 frogs located in the town centre, for which they have also published a walking trail.

The leaflet for that is available on the website with paper copies available around the town.
