Welcome to our March Newsletter. It's been lovely to see a bit of colour emerging at the station as our spring bulbs make a welcome return.



What hasn't been lovely to see is the increase in antisocial behaviour. There have been a number of occasions when the fantastic staff at the station have had to intervene to prevent damage being caused. Passengers have also been threatened and they have unfortunately had to be inconvenienced with the waiting rooms being locked out of use at times to prevent access to those intent on creating

havoc. We have also had a person or persons unknown ignoring poster requests to stop feeding the pigeons as they have been making the subway and steps to

platform 2 a real mess.

Every time the staff sweep up the pieces of bread and seed they are being replaced. This makes it so difficult for all those doing their best to keep the station presentable for the benefit of the vast majority of station users.

However, the highlight of the past month has been the incredible progress made on our new garden area at the foot of the slope down to the station car park. This, as you will read below, has been made thanks to the generous giving of time and materials by everyone from Buckingham, the contractors who have been working on the bridge and platforms at the station.

TASK SESSIONS



We did manage to hold a very well attended formal Task Session on 12th February 2022, but as touched on in this month's introduction that doesn't tell the full story. There have been a number of ad hoc sessions where a great deal of work has been undertaken led by Boguslaw (Bogsey) Kozlowski (Project Manager), Ian Jackson (Jacko) and all the team from Buckingham Group Contracting Ltd.



It all kicked off when aware of what we wanted to achieve ballast was donated by Buckingham and placed in the proposed garden area ready for laying.

Then our planters were levelled up using sand before all the ballast was put into place.

As part of that work the Buckingham's Team indicated that they had a load of

timber that had been removed from the station bridge as part of the ongoing work.

Seeing that we had already had a timber retaining wall built at the front of the garden they offered to recycle the timber from the bridge and use it to construct an all-round timber wall. In doing so they really made the whole area look fantastic as well as providing a sound barrier between the invasive ivy on the slope and our garden.

Having done all of that work, including the levelling out of the recycled stone ballast, they then set about putting in place our new interpretive board which will inform those visiting the station more about what we do as well as giving a potted history of the station and the line.

A few words here cannot really fully express our gratitude to everyone from Buckingham who have done such a tramendous job for us and all for the "price"

tremendous job for us and all for the "price" of some Mars Bar and Ginger Cake.





In addition to the garden work they attached our "homemade" birdfeeder to the gable end of the station buildings.

We were sorry to see them all move onto their next job as they are an incredible bunch. If only all contractors had their community spirit.

We are aiming to finish off the garden (filling the planters with top grade topsoil followed by the planting of numerous plants – all kindly funded by Northern and TfGM) at the next Task Session.

This will take place during the afternoon of Saturday 12th March (from 2pm).



We will probably have a more "formal opening" in a few months' time which will include the unveiling of a plaque, once we decide on a name for the garden, which will be based the fantastic achievement of Her Majesty the Queen having completed 70 wonderful years on the throne.

We will be discussing the name etc. at the Annual General Meeting on 15th March 2022.

Eventually, when everything is complete we will hopefully have improved that side of the station to such an extent that it not only provides a great visual welcome to those accessing the station through the car park but will also promote the station even more as people read all about it.

STATION BRIDGE AND PLATFORM EXTENSION WORKS


We reported on the ongoing work last month as Network Rail and their contractors (Buckingham) set about repairing the station bridge over Compstall Road as well as undertaking work to extend both platforms.

They certainly weren't slow in getting things done and as anyone will have seen if they walked past the station at weekends or used the station during the week the team from Buckingham have been pulling out all the stops in carrying out their tasks.

As this picture shows the entire area of each platform carried on the road bridge was



removed before being replaced by what we would describe as massive Meccano pieces before the platform surface was either put back or replaced.



The contractors have also been busy with extending the platforms and the new sections were brought into use towards the end of February.

GREEN HEARTS CRAFTING SESSION
