### DECORATE A TRAIN FOR THE QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE



Regular readers will know that as part of our Platinum Jubilee celebrations we invited young people in the area to help us brighten up the station by designing their own jubilee train using an outline of one of the new Class 195 trains as it passed through Romiley.

We contacted our four local primary schools and let them have everything needed for their pupils to have a go.

To say that we were delighted by the number and quality of entries would be something of an understatement.

By the closing date at the end of May we had received well over 160 entries.

Thankfully, we didn't have to carry out the judging as our friends from the Romiley and Marple Lions Club kindly volunteered to go through all the entries before selecting the four winners, one from each school.

Our task was to set about displaying every single entry at the station so that they could all be seen and appreciated.

We practically filled the two waiting rooms with them but it was really worth it.

As for the four winners we created a separate display of their entries by the main entrance on Stockport Road. We also had their individual entries framed and mounted to show that they were a winner.

Sadly the station suffered yet more vandalism in June with extensive damage being caused to the fencing on Platform 2 and by the ramp that leads up to the platform.

ISS, Northern's contractors, have been fighting something of a losing battle for no sooner have they repaired the fencing then it gets damaged again.

The British Transport Police have been

advised but it is clearly rather low down on their list of priorities and accordingly their response is not what we would have liked to have seen.

On Thursday 2nd June several youths were spoken to at the station by two officers (and a photograph was taken at the time by station staff). However, once the officers had left the youths returned and not only damaged the fencing but also some of the children's artwork at the station.



Unfortunately, this is not a problem confined to Romiley, as other stations in the area are

being targeted as well by youths who seem to freely travel about on the trains with impunity.

# DAVIES AND METCALFE LIMITED (FORMERLY OF ROMILEY)



For many years Romiley was home to Davies and Metcalfe, a railway equipment and locomotive manufacturer. It was founded in Aberystwyth in 1878 and in 1902 built two 2-6-2T locomotives for the 1ft 11<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> in gauge Vale of Rheidol Railway at Aberystwyth before moving to Romiley. The company is now part of Sabwabco Davies & Metcalfe Ltd of Leek, Staffordshire.

We have been in close contact with Richard Metcalfe, the company's managing director, who supports our desire to mark the company's time in Romiley in some way at the station.

He has approved our using one of the company's old posters and so we now have on order two copies (pictured here) which will be some 5ft high and will be placed on the gable end of the ramp to Platform 2 and at the entrance to Platform 1.

#### STEAM TRAIN – JUBILEE BUXTON SPA EXPRESS

During the afternoon of Friday 3rd June the steam hauled Jubilee Buxton Spa Express passed through Romiley on its way from Buxton to West Ealing.

It was pulled by "45596" Bahamas, which is now based at Ingrow (on the Keighley and Worth Valley Railway) where it is lovingly cared for by the Bahamas Locomotive Society.

London Midland and Scottish Railway (LMS) Jubilee Class 5596 (BR number 45596) Bahamas was built as a standard Jubilee Class locomotive in 1934 by the North British Locomotive Company for the LMS.

In July 1966, Bahamas, then located in Stockport, was withdrawn from traffic and a preservation society was founded to prevent it from being scrapped.





The society managed to acquire it for After repairs by the Hunslet Engine Company in Leeds, Bahamas was transported to Dinting Railway Museum, near Glossop..

Upon Dinting's closure in 1990 it moved to its current location. It's last big overhaul commenced in 2013 before being brought back into mainline service during 2019 with its first trip taking in the famous Settle to Carlisle route.

Unfortunately, a further steam train which was scheduled to pass through Romiley on Saturday 25th June was cancelled as a result of the rail strike.

#### MORE PLATINUM JUBILEE DISPLAYS AT THE STATION

As already mentioned much of our Platinum Jubilee displays at the station consisted of the artwork provided in response to our 'Decorate a Train' competition.

However, we also worked closely with other local community groups (including the Romiley Women's Institute who made all the bunting for use, the Cherry Tree Project who put together some great displays and the local schools who provided some additional artwork).
