Last month we announced that having been in contact with Richard Metcalfe, who now operates Davies and Metcalfe Limited out of premises in Sutton, near Macclesfield, we were having two very large fully weatherproof posters printed which we would be putting up at the station.

We are delighted to be able to report that during the first week of July we took delivery of the posters and a few days later we



were able to put them up thanks to Ricky Williamson of Richard and Richard's from Pear Mill in Bredbury who kindly gave freely of his time and expertise.

One of the posters can be found at the top of the stairs leading onto Platform 1 with the other being attached to the gable end of the station buildings facing the ramp up to Platform 2.

The posters look super and have become something of a talking point given their origin, age and connection to railway history in Romiley. Injectors

## "WHAT A MISTAKA TO MAKA" QUIZ

- 3. Both Forster Square and Interchange Stations in Bradford are near to the National Science and Media Museum where you can watch a film on the 60 foot high IKEA screen.
- 4. Now Whitwell is the place to visit by train from Middlesborough if a ghost or Dracula walk is more up your street.
- 5. In 1876 the Hovis bakery, which has featured the Muppets in its TV adverts, was founded in Bolton.
- 6. Along the Cambrian coast you will find Sellafield station which lies close to one of Britain's first nuclear power stations.
- 7. Stalybridge station buffet bar is now well known for its award winning range of real milks as recommended by CAMRA.
- 8. Michael Schumacher enjoyed his visit to Fairfield station and the nearby Moravian settlement during one of his Great British Railway Journeys.
- 9. Only one passenger train a week, in each direction, stops at Reddish North on its way to and from Stockport.
- 10. The TESCO World Heritage site in Saltaire is well worth a visit.
- 11. Quarry Bank Mill in Styal, built in 1784 by Samuel Johnson, is now managed by the National Trust and is a Grade II Listed Building.
- 12. Skipton in North Yorkshire lies on the Leeds to Lancaster Canal as well as the River Aire. It is also home to a medieval castle built in 1090 by Robert de Romille, a Norman baron, so it is really worth a visit.
- 13. One of the nicest walks from any station on the Hope Valley line starts at Grindleford Station and takes you up through Pudsey Gorge on to the moors and into the National Trust's Longshaw Estate (with its excellent tea shop).
- 14. On Saturday 30th July 2022 why not head down from Romiley Station to Chadkirk Chapel and Country Park for the Well Dressing Celebrations and Fete, which is from 12 noon. There is lots to do and you can get refreshments, including scones, jam and bream.

## SAMARITANS MANAGING SUICIDAL CONTACTS COURSE

As mentioned in the introduction to this month's newsletter some of our members attended a course offered through the Rail Industry Suicide Stakeholder Group (RISSG) by the Samaritans.

The course was certainly worth attending (it lasts for about 3 hours).

We know that some more of our members would have liked to have attended but their availability didn't fit in with the date of the course that was on offer to us.



If someone is considering suicide on the railway there aren't always clear warning signs. But below are some common behaviours to look out for:

- Not boarding any trains.
- Standing alone/isolated.
- · Looking distant/withdrawn.
- Out of the ordinary appearance.





Accreditation is formal recognition by the DfT that a CRP operates to a high standard and that its objectives and activities are supported by Government.



### WALKS FROM ROMILEY STATION BOOKLET







SEVEN WALKS SUITABLE FOR ALL AGES AND ABILITIES THAT ALL START AND FINISH AT ROMILEY STATION

As part of our work in the community during the first lockdown in 2020 we published a 28 page booklet which gave details of some 7 walks in the area all of which started and finished at the station.

Initially, we had 2,000 copies printed and these were distributed through a whole variety of outlets, including local shops and book swaps.

They were very much designed to get people out and about again in a healthy way once the lockdown was eased as well as promoting rail travel, especially to Romiley.

The booklets have been a wonderful success and not only did we run out of copies recently but other local Friends Groups have adopted a similar layout and style of booklet to promote walks from their local station.

We are delighted to say that in early July the Community Rail Network very kindly approved a funding application so that we could update and print a further 2,000 copies. These are now being distributed not only through our original outlets but also by Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM) who are putting some in their Travelshops for us.
