VJ (VICTORY OVER JAPAN) DAY DISPLAY

In our last two newsletters we mentioned that we would be erecting a VJ80 display at the station centred around origami cranes, which are associated with the Hiroshima Peace Park.

We asked people to help us by making the cranes and either getting them to us or dropping them off at the ticket office. Several people offered to do this, in

particular, Gill Fryers and Anne-Marie Warwick, who between them made around 600 cranes of varying colours and sizes.

Gill who has visited Hiroshima and toured the Peace Park used origami paper that she brought back from Japan for some of her cranes. One of our members spent time threading them up individually, then wiring them into garlands to hang around the entrance area.



On Saturday 9th August Saturday we spent the afternoon putting the cranes on display, draping them across the stairwell right up to platform level, where they look magnificent. They are full of vibrant colour and almost alive when caught in the breezes that regularly blow through the entrance.

We have also included information explaining the significance and symbolism of the cranes, plus the story of Len Burton, Stockport's youngest Prisoner of War, who survived the terrible conditions endured at the hands of the Japanese army.

The cranes will grace the area until some time in



September, depending on how well they fare in the conditions there. After that they are going on



display at Bredbury Library before being disassembled and re-stringed ready for them to be posted to Hiroshima along with thousands of others sent there from around the world.

We would really like to thank everyone who has helped to make this beautiful community display possible.

On the Sunday following VJ80 (17th August) the community in Romiley very much came together at Romiley Forum for a superb afternoon concert of commemoration performed by the magnificent KNDS Fairey Band under the musical direction of Captain Andrew Porter, the Director of Music for the Grenadier Guards



NORTHERN – COMMUNITY RAIL REPORT 2025





A CELEBRATION OF HYDE - HYDE CENTRAL STATION SATURDAY, 20TH SEPTEMBER 2025

Everyone is invited along to Hyde Central station on Saturday 20th September to join the Friends of Hyde Loop as along with the people of Hyde they mark three exciting milestones in the history of the town.

At 3.30pm there will be a civic welcome and opening address by the



Mayor of Tameside, Councillor Shibley Alam, who will formally open the event and share reflections on Hyde's community spirit and forward-looking regeneration.

This will be followed by an introduction to the 20 Heritage Interpretation Panels exploring Hyde's rich legacy of social, industrial and railway heritage.

Later in the afternoon there will be the switching on of the LED Wayfinding Lighting System which is a new modern lighting feature designed to enhance safety, accessibility and ambience to and from Hyde Town Centre to Hyde Central Station.

Finally, the Sheffield to Manchester Steel and Cotton Trail will be introduced by Councillor Peter Robinson, Chair of the South East Manchester Community Rail Partnership. Leaflets will be available for the Romiley to Hyde section of the new innovative leisure cycling and walking route.

The formal ceremony will take place on the station forecourt followed by controlled access to Platforms 1 and 2 to view the Heritage Interpretation Panels.

Re-enactors will be showcasing Period Railway Uniforms and there will be free light refreshments served by the Hyde Young Peoples Enterprise.

RAILWAY 200 QUIZ - THE ANSWERS

- 1. (C) 26 The Stockton & Darlington's 26-mile-long mainline was located in the north east of England in the historic County of Durham. It ran from the coal mines near Witton Park to the River Tees at Stockton, via Darlington and Yarm where there were two branch lines. Within the next five years it had an additional three branch lines at Croft, Haggerleases and Middlesbrough. It was amalgamated with the North Eastern Railway in 1863.
- 2. **(B) Locomotion No.1** The locomotive itself was actually driven by George Stephenson himself for the first trip.
- 3. (A) 1829 The Rainhill trials were a competition run from 6 to 14 October 1829, to test George Stephenson's argument that locomotives would have the best motive power for the nearly-completed Liverpool and Manchester Railway (L&MR). Some 10 locomotives were entered, of which 5 were able to compete, running along a 1 mile (1.6 km) length of level track at Rainhill, in Lancashire (now Merseyside). Stephenson's Rocket was the only locomotive to complete the trials and was declared the winner.
- 4. **(D) Museum** The former station, that actually closed in1844 and is a Grade I listed building, is now part of the Science and Industry Museum. It lost its connection to the rail network in 2017 with the construction of the Ordsall Chord
- 5. **(A) Pre-printed tickets** The Edmondson railway ticket was a ticket system that also recorded the payment of railway fares and accounted for the revenue raised. It was named after its inventor.



Pictured here is an Edmondson ticket issued by the Midland Railway for travel from Peak Forest to Romiley.

6. **(D) 7 ft** ¼ **inch** Brunel originally built the Great Western Railway to his unique broad gauge as he thought this would give extra speed and comfort.


However, as the railway network expanded the Great Western had increasing problems with transhipping goods onto the standard gauge of 4 ft 8 ½ inch that prevails to this day. The broad gauge was finally abandoned in 1892.

7. **(A) Cantilever** The Forth Bridge is considered a symbol of Scotland (having been voted Scotland's greatest man-made wonder in 2016). It was designed by English engineers Sir John Fowler and Sir Benjamin Baker.



Construction of the bridge began in 1882 and it was opened on 4 March 1890 by the Duke of Rothesay, the future Edward VII. The bridge carries the railway across the Forth between the villages of South and North Queensferry and has a total length of 2,467 metres (8,094 ft). When it opened it had the longest single cantilever bridge span in the world. It continues to be the world's second-longest single cantilever span (only the Quebec Bridge in Canada is longer) with two spans of 1,709 feet (521 m).

8. **(B) MS&LR** Romiley station was built by the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway as part of its extension to New Mills. It opened in 1862





In 1869 the Macclesfield, Bollington and Marple Railway was opened



running from Marple Wharf Junction to Macclesfield. Other than for the service to Rose Hill this line closed in January 1970.

9. **(C) World War I** During World War I, the government took control of the railways under the Regulation of the Forces Act 1871. This action was taken on 5th August 1914, the day after war was declared, to ensure efficient transportation for military and civilian needs.

- 10. **(C) London & South Eastern Railway (LSER)** The London & South Eastern Railway Limited, trading as Southeastern, was a Train Operating Company owned by Govia that operated passenger rail services in South East England from 2006 until 2021. The missing Big Four company in our list was the London, Midland and Scottish Railway (LMS).
- 11. **(C) Sir Nigel Gresley**A LNER Class A4
 steam locomotive, the
 same class as Mallard,
 that bears his name
 was preserved and still
 operates today



- 12. **(C) Clement Atlee** He was Prime Minister from 1945 until 1951. His Labour government also established the National Health Service.
- 13. **(C) 1960** Evening Star was completed during March 1960 and was the 999th steam locomotive built by British Rail.
- 14. **(C)** The Reshaping of British Railways The report identified 2,363 stations and 5,000 miles of railway line for closure which represented 55% of all stations and 30% of route miles.
- 15. **(C) Chapel-en-le-Frith** A plaque commemorating the events of that day is mounted on the station buildings at Chapel-en-le-Frith facing onto the southbound platform.



- 16. **(A) The Channel Tunnel was opened** The Channel Tunnel opened on 6th May 1994. As for the other options WiFi was first introduced onto trains during 2003, the same year in which a Eurostar train reached 208mph to break the UK's train speed record, As for Railtrack it was wound up and replaced by Network Rail during 2002.
- 17. **(D) 2007** Eurostar's London terminus moved from Waterloo International to St Pancras International in November 2007 to coincide with the opening of High Speed 1 (HS1), the dedicated rail line that connects London to the Channel Tunnel.
